FLOOD RISK

We have been pretty lucky so far this autumn and, as this is written, there have been no serious floods in the village either from the river or from surface water. Mill Lane has not been inundated and the usual collection points have been drained quickly.

However the likelihood of flooding increases at this time of year and it is worth reminding householders of the risks.

There are several 'hotspots' where torrential rain is bound to result in pools... Church St, High St, Kings Street and Newton Rd are all vulnerable. Please be wary of these situations....the water may not be very deep but driving through it at speed will jeopardise properties and pedestrians close by....and may result in your ignition system being flooded. You will get no sympathy for this....indeed you could be prosecuted for assault if you drench pedestrians....there is a precedent!

Only the police have authority to close roads...flood wardens can put up warning signs but we will contact the police in instances where we think a flood becomes dangerous. That happened 3 times last winter when drivers who had foolishly ignored signs were trapped in their immobilised cars on Mill Lane. In those situations, once the people were safe the police were not interested in recovery of vehicles (unless they were blocking the road) this being entirely the owner's responsibility...and insurance companies are unlikely to pay out on claims where road signs have been ignored. Needless to say the parish has no mechanism to recover vehicles in those cases.

The flood team have recently been issued with a small allocation of (empty) sandbags and, if you think your property is at risk from rising surface water or passing vehicles causing waves, you are welcome to keep a couple in stock....you will need your own sand supply to fill them when needed...they are effective but organic and will only suit for one event lasting a few days. Contact me for details.

The road gullies sited along the principal routes are deep soakaways, not connected to a pipe system. So if they get blocked by solid debris at the grill level they will not drain quickly. I can report blocked public drains to Dorset Council and they have been pretty efficient in the past at sending round a clearance team. If you notice one near you feel free to contact me and I will pass on the information.... I need a position identification and which side of the road.

Here's hoping for a dry(ish) winter!

Aircraft Crash And Lucky Escapes Near Sturminster Marshall

In June 1956 a Vickers Armstrong SuperMarine Swift from the former RAF Chilbolton airfield in Hampshire, flown by test pilot George Horne, was returning to base when the engine developed a serious fault as it approached Sturminster Marshall. Witnesses stated that the engine suddenly cut out followed by two loud bangs. Pilot Horne made the decision to eject. The plane carried on over the village and headed another few miles toward Barford Farm, Cowgrove.

Pilot George Horne had ejected at 3500 feet and came down near the then Black Horse Inn (now the Golden Fox), and a story goes that he landed in an a tree in the pub garden and the then Landlord, a certain John Sibley, on hearing all the noise, went into the garden saw George Horne hanging there asked him if he could do with a drink.

"Where am I then?" says George.

"Back garden of my pub, the Black Horse, Sturminster Marshall" says John.

"Couldn't think of a better place to come down" said George "I'll have a double Brandy please".

After his drink and a wash and brush-up in the pub, George was feeling a little better after his experience and began to think about his plane.

Meanwhile back at Barford farm, tractor driver Jim Mouland had just driven across a field when the plane appeared flying low and just missing some high voltage electricity lines and came down and exploded in a ball of fire in the very field Jim had just driven across and wreckage was spread over a quarter mile radius. Across the way, near the farm, dairyman Bert Endicott was doing what dairymen do when he heard a bang on the dairy roof and a piece of debris from the plane came through the roof and clipped the top of his head, luckily just a graze. In the nearby cottage where Bert lived with his wife Brenda, a large piece of earth smashed through the roof and bedroom ceiling and damaged a vase on a shelf. Other workers had lucky escapes but no serious injuries as the wreckage fell on other farm buildings. The fire brigade and ambulance service arrived swiftly but were not needed as no serious casualties and the flames from the burning plane had died out.

Bert's daughter Pat had come home from school and wondered what all the excitement was and was quite enthralled when her Mother told her all that had happened.

Many thanks to Pat, who still lives in the village, and supplied her memories of the event and let me have a copy of the original newspaper report. As for the Black Horse story I cannot fully verify that, but Pat remembers her Mother talking about it, as she knew Mrs. Sibley. So if there is anyone out there that knows anymore I would love to Know.

Are you eligible for Pension Credit?

Check your eligibility for Pension Credit online.

Eligibility orbina apply for the equivalent in Scotland

The Winter Fuel Payment is an annual payment to help you with heating costs during the colder months. The Government announced in July 2024 that, from this year onwards, to be eligible you must have reached State Pension age and also receive a qualifying means-tested benefit e.g. pension credit, universal credit or income support.

The last possible date to make a successful backdated claim to receive the Winter Fuel Payment is 21 December. Applications for Pension Credit can be made on the <u>How to Claim</u> page on GOV.UK or over the phone by calling 0800 99 1234 (Monday to Friday 8am to 6pm).



December Celebrations

Christmas is unarguably the most popular December celebration. The day marks the birth of Jesus Christ of Nazareth, whom Christians believe to be the son of God sent to save humanity from sin. What sets Christmas apart

from most religious festivals is that the day is generally celebrated even by non-Christians. Father Christmas brings gifts just as the Magi brought gifts to the baby Jesus.



But it is not the only Festival celebrated in December.

Hannukah or the Festival of Lights, is an 8-day Jewish festival that, this year, falls between November 28 and December 6. Hannukah is a period to celebrate the re-dedication of the Second Temple of Jerusalem after



the Maccabean Revolt. The celebrations include lighting of candles every night throughout the eight days, singing of special songs, as well as reciting of the Hallel prayer. Other popular Hannukah customs include eating oil-dried foods such as potato pancakes and jam-filled donuts.

Santa Lucia was an Italian Saint that died as a martyr is remembered and celebrated each December 13th in Sweden as a symbol of light and hope.

This important day is marked by atmospheric concerts and processions, featuring singers clad in white and wearing headdresses featuring actual flickering candles.



Yule, also called Yuletide, is a festival marked by Germanic people around the world. The festival has pagan roots and can be traced back to the Norse god Odin as well as the Anglo-Saxon festival of Modraniht. Yuletide technically falls within the Winter Solstice, making it one of the oldest and most popular winter celebrations in the world. Ancient people marked




Yule by lighting a huge log in a bonfire and spending the long night outdoors.



Nature's Voice

During half term, we had the rather dubious pleasure of needing to buy a car to replace a very old one that had an unfortunate, but small, bump and was written off, as they do seem to do over a small thing these days, by the insurance company. We'd looked at a few and they were all 'fine'... We're not really 'car people' and so it was a tricky decision. On the way to see the last one, which was over in Christchurch, we were treated to, what the children are calling, a good omen, that I'm sure helped seal the deal! After years of searching the skies and hoping and wondering, we finally spotted one of the local white tailed eagles!

They are our largest bird of prey and are regularly seen around Poole Harbour.

Needless to say, we were all in a good mood when we arrived at the garage. The young chap showing us the car had no idea what I was talking about but said he'd tell his manager who was apparently 'into birds.'



There'll be a welcome return of the vintage carousel, the usual festive feel in the Laundry Courtyard and the cafe, and Storytelling with Santa (booking essential, tickets £15 per child). We hope many of you will get the chance to visit and bring friends and family for

what we hope will be plenty of festive fun.

In other news, we are cracking on with the maintenance work on the Woodland Walk, where we are removing 30 per cent of the tree canopy to change the woodland from a dense, dark environment to a light and airy habitat.

Much of the woodland was planted after storms in the 1980s, but since then very little management has taken place and botanical surveys have shown there is virtually no ground flora with young trees unable to grow strongly due to the lack of light. Ash die back has also affected many ash trees, which need to be felled for safety reasons.

Usable wood is being taken off site, but fluffy "brash" (the top part of the tree) will be left on the woodland floor to encourage natural regeneration and for wildlife habitat.

The work is scheduled until February, but we are hopeful it will be completed well before then.

Talking Big Red

Farming life - there is nothing like it. The majority of it governed by the weather, and when bad weather is on its way it is all ' go go go ' to get the work done and finished while you can.

It was on such a day that after pushing to get 2nd cut haylage, and late cut hay in, straw baled, etc. that as it got dark, we had calls, messages, turned out from a good Samaritan walker of the footpaths around our fields. 'You have one of your Red cows in trouble having a calf!

That is the time you have to drop everything and grab the calving ropes and a torch and head for the field .Sure enough my favourite Red 'Honiton' was struggling to give birth to what looks the size of a 'Donkey!! It is not usually easy to approach a calving cow in the middle of a field - in the dark by torchlight - but we are talking Honiton. She, far from running away, was reversing into us with a look on her face of 'give us a hand with this one..' We attached the calving ropes to the calves front feet to enable us to help her - that done, we started to apply pulling pressure, and she started to push. The front legs and head came - but got stuck at the hips .More pulling saw the big bull calf born. Poor farmer at the sudden exit ended up bowling backwards over the grass. - thankfully avoiding any cow pats!! But a good result, a healthy calf and a happy mum. But Honiton, unlike other cows, does not greet her calf with soft 'Moo's'. She bellows at the top of her lungs! It was a standing joke after her first calf that it would be deaf in a week!! That was some years ago - and she has had many calves since and every time it is the same! But mum and new born were sorted and well - best left now to bond.

A day or so later we had another job to do, the castration and ear tagging. Calves, by law, have to. We set off for their field, taggers in one pocket, castrators loaded in the other. We caught the calf but on fishing out the ear taggers, a tag was missing, lost in the field. Grrrr! We have to let calf go to search for the missing ear tag! That found (thankfully ours are bright yellow making it easier to find in the mud!) Then back to recatch the big boy.

All went to plan and the Bull calf was caught, again, and this time ear tagged with his corresponding passport number. As I held onto him, Farmer manipulated the reproductive bits into the castrating band. Honiton, not helping, was busy licking her calve's underbelly and at risk of having her tongue wearing a castration ring!! As Farmer is muttering at Honiton to keep her dam tongue out the way, and I hold onto the monster calf, I realise my right foot is feeling very warm - aid bull calf is having a pee - and it is going right down my boot. But now was not the time to move. Oh joy!!

Finally the job is done. Mum set off with her calf at foot, bellowing as she went, and me - time to change my socks I think - and my boots!

It is with great thanks to Graham who, from the footpath, realised that she was having difficulty, I say 'Thank you Graham'.

'YULE; WHAT ELSE'...by Lys de Bray

Many gardener's thoughts are about Christmas and Christmas day itself, of course, and you will already have planned what you're going to do (or, virtuously, have already done it in the way of gifts) This is magic-wand time, and what fun this is! The garden centres are or have been chock-full of gift ideas, so I'm not going to make any suggestions. Well, maybe a few... and instead I'll talk about spring. Think trees to start with. If gifts have yet to be bought, a young tree in a pot is a happy thought. This will need a consultation with the lucky recipient so the element of surprise won't be there, but on the other hand, what he or she says about trees in general and liking or wanting this or that will give you ideas, and then it will be a surprise. I've grouped them into types to help with the decision.

Big trees (ultimately) (2) Average-height trees. (3) Small trees (4) Evergreen trees.
 Conifers (6) Trees for blossom (7) Fruit trees (8) Foliage trees (9) Trees for autumn colour. (10) Ultimate specimen trees. (11) Bonsai trees

(1) Big trees may come with baggage so homework must be done first, such as local bylaws. If your friend has a large garden there should be no problem, nevertheless, check.

<u>Native forest trees:</u> Oak, Ash, Pine, Beech, Chestnut, Sycamore, Willow; several kinds. Likes damp situations.

<u>Average height trees:</u> Hawthorn, several kinds; good for thorny hedging Reminds me of the time when elephants ate our hedge. (we lived in Kent...)

<u>Small trees:</u> Prunus (Sloe) Thorny native hedging.tree: A froth of not-quite-white blossom in spring and very tart, bitter fruits in autumn. Essential for sloe gin. Rowan, creamy flowers in spring and sprays of orange-red berries in autumn. A magical and legendary tree, often seen growing in rocky and inhospitable environments in Scotland.

<u>Evergreen trees:</u> Holly: Very many varieties. Eucalyptus: tall tree with sprays of small creamy flowers and leathery grey-green-blue aromatic leaves. Laurel: Several kinds; tough and invasive. Good for hedging, but needs firm management.

<u>Conifers:</u> Leylandi is (in)famous for its colonising tendencies, but grown correctly it makes excellent hedging. However, if you go to Peru and stay longer than intended, when you come back you may find your Leylandiii hedge has eaten your house. Other conifers may be had with better manners and they come in all sizes and shades of green, silvery blue, yellow/gold, dark red, nearly black, and variegated. Go to a specialist nursery for them because with your purchase(s) you will get excellent cultural advice. If you live near chalky Badbury Rings, the soil around there will be wrong for your tree(s).

<u>Trees for blossom</u>: Think of an apple orchard in full bloom in spring, all the trees a-buzz with happy, hardworking bees, and a perfect spring like this means lots of fruit come autumn. Most trees that are hardy in the UK will flower in spring, which gives them maximum time to produce fruits ripening in autumn to make seed for the next generation. It all seems very tidy and organised, but the right weather at the right time is crucial.

<u>Foliage Trees:</u> In the British Isles we are fortunate in being able to grow semi-tropical foliage trees, mostly in Devon and Cornwall where I lived from 1939 until about 1945 As you will see, I haven't finished my list which I will for next month's article. Promise!
